



Annual Report

Financial year 1 April 2019 - 31 March 2020









Our vision is for an inclusive, modern, sustainable and high quality public library service at the heart of every community in West Berkshire. This is our third annual report and it is intended to give you an idea of what libraries do, who uses them, our staff and volunteers, what the service costs are and how much town and parishes contributed to them in the previous financial year, April 2019 to March 2020.

We have provided data for each branch library and a summary for the whole service. We have included comparative data for the previous financial year 2018-19 as this is a useful way to identify the main trends in library usage and tailor our service accordingly.

Please note that because of the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic we had some unforeseen library closures in mid-March and our Mobile Library was unable to run from 17 March 2020. West Berkshire Libraries closed all buildings from 23 March 2020 in line with government requirements for a nationwide lockdown. As a result, our data for 2019-20 is not representative of a complete year and is therefore slightly lower than expected. For example, we estimate that without these enforced closures the number of visits this year would have exceeded those for 2018-19.

We are always happy to share general data about library usage - we do not share any customer, staff or volunteer details - but please be mindful that requests take up staff time and their priority is to help customers use our services.

"Over the last decade public library services nationally have experienced a gradual decline in usage. We're delighted to announce that, for the second year running, library usage in the district is increasing. We've done that by listening to customers and developing the service accordingly – including investing in book stock, IT and library buildings and by communicating effectively. Despite the impact of COVID-19 in March this year, the library service again proved very popular with customers. I wish to thank our staff and many volunteers who have, again, done a great job for local residents. If you are not already a member, do join. It's free for residents and the extent of what the service provides may surprise you."

Highlights

The library service is FREE for everyone, of any age, living, working or studying in West Berkshire. We have eight libraries and one Mobile Library which are open 220 hours a week between them. Our 46 staff (24.93 full-time equivalent posts), along with our 354 library volunteers, delivered library services to 346,895 visitors during the year.

It is particularly pleasing to see that the number of new library users increased by 7.52% as this was one of the particular challenges we set ourselves last year.

We added 15,237 items of new library stock to our collection, and customer reservations continued to rise this year by 20.54%. We also invested some targeted funding to strengthen specific areas of our library collection. We are delighted that our overall library loans increased by 6.8% to 571,352.

In June 2019 we launched PressReader, our online newspaper service, giving library members free access to thousands of the world's top newspapers as soon as they are available on the shelves. This contributed to the continued growth of our hugely successful e-library.

A particular focus this year was to develop closer links with children and families through working more closely with schools and West Berkshire Family Hubs. The recent restructure of our Librarian Team has allowed us to concentrate more staff resources in this area. We have made good links with the Central Family Hub in Thatcham and have been working with them to enable their Toy Library stock to be integrated into our Library Management System.

During the summer over 3,000 children in West Berkshire participated in The Reading Agency's Space Chase Summer Reading Challenge, which was a great success. This involved 19.2% of 4-12yrs population in West Berks and was the highest percentage reach in the south east region, with an average for the UK of 9.6%.

Our social media continued to grow in popularity and at the end of March 2020 we had over 2,000 followers on Twitter and nearly 1,700 on Facebook. In September 2019 we set up an Instagram account.

Household internet access has continued to rise over the last decade and in 2019 the Office of National Statistics (*ONS, 2019) reported that almost two thirds of households now have mobile broadband access. In line with this, library computer use has declined during the past few years and our data reflects this national trend. We are aware though that for the proportion of the population that does not have access to the internet, our public access computers are still a vital part of facilitating social inclusion.

In October 2019 we used capital funding to replace all our public access computers (hardware and software) as they were several years old and needed updating. In some libraries we reduced the number of public access computers. This created additional study spaces for laptop users and has been well received by customers who can now use their own devices on our wi-fi network.

The project to offer chip and PIN/contactless payment facilities in all libraries through our self-service kiosks was also completed this year.

In terms of investment in our library buildings, the refurbishment of Pangbourne Library took place in October 2019.

Challenges and plans for 2020/21

COVID-19 has transformed our way of life and our library service is adapting quickly in response. At the same time, the tremendous public appetite for e-reading and online services is increasing our membership and creating long-term digital engagement with our customers. We are making plans to ensure that we balance this with the physical library offer to make sure both are valued. Libraries have always been seen as safe places for communities to come together. We want to retain this, but providing this safe space is more challenging because of the need to take government social distancing and other public safety requirements into account.

These are just some of our plans for 2020-21:

- Restore and provide appropriate adaptation of library services during and after COVID-19.
- Launch a West Berkshire Libraries app and a separate Children's Library app which will allow our customers to access library services from their personal mobile devices, and manage their account, search the catalogue and renew and reserve books. Customers will also be able to check out books in the library through their mobile devices.
- Offer regular online storytimes and craft activities, as well as in libraries when it is safe to do so again.
- Develop an online book group, West Berks Reads.
- Start a virtual Code Club for 9-11 year olds, giving them the opportunity to learn to code and make their own games, animations, and websites.
- Increase school class visits (including virtual class visits where appropriate).
- Work with the Central Family Hub in Thatcham to make their Toy Library stock available for loan and reservation through our library management system.

- Complete a refurbishment of Thatcham Library.
- Launch a new customer e-newsletter.
- Increase engagement with social media, particularly our new Instagram account.
- Set up more library working groups for each library. Library working groups have already proved their worth by directly involving local people who give feedback from their community which helps us to increase library usage.

About the service

As well as providing free access to over 115,000 books to borrow, last year we provided:

- A safe place to go and meet.
- Free computer use and wi-fi.
- Self-service printing, photocopying and scanning to email.
- Rooms for hire.
- Special events and craft activities.
- Free downloadable e-books, e-magazines and e-newspapers.
- Audiobooks and e-audiobooks to listen to on the go.
- Large print books.
- Children's services, including regular, well attended children's events (Storytimes, Rhymetimes, Code Club, craft activities and other occasional events such as the Watermill Theatre productions).

- Summer Reading Challenge: almost 3,000 children took part last year.
- Nursery and class visits.
- Bookstart: we delivered over 3,500 Bookstart packs to babies and to children aged 3-4
 via health visitors and educational settings and facilitated the delivery of a BookTrust 'Time
 To Read' pack to every child starting in a Reception class in West Berkshire.
- Online resources to use in the library and at home:
 - Access to Research 1.5 million academic and research journals (linking with secondary schools).
 - Britannica Online three different, age appropriate editions of this encyclopedia.
 - British Newspaper Archive millions of pages of historical newspapers from the British Library collection.
 - **GoCitizen** online resource for candidates preparing for the Life in the UK test (British citizenship).
 - Theory Test Pro online simulation of the UK driving theory test and hazard perception tests.

- Book groups: hundreds of titles available in book group sets of 10 copies (annual fee applies).
- Family History:
 - Local and family history resources.
 - Free access to Ancestry online database in the library.
 - Free bookable sessions with Berkshire Family History Society.
- Mobile and At Home services our volunteers delivered books throughout the year to 127 housebound readers.

How much did it cost / how much income did we generate?

People sometimes ask how much a certain library branch costs. Some costs are specific to a branch – for example, staff, energy, rates and maintenance – while others are shared with the whole service – professional librarian and back office staff, emergency staff cover, book stock, ICT support, etc. All the parts of the service are inter-dependent, so all branch libraries benefit from being part of the wider service and the library service as a whole benefits from being part of West Berkshire Council – for example, corporate support for ICT, finance, maintenance, health and safety, HR, energy and phone contracts.

Our costs include staff, buying books and digital library stock, ICT, building maintenance, energy costs, business rates and marketing. Our income includes voluntary contributions from town and parish councils, library item charges and fines, income from rent and room hire, events, book sales and grants.

In the information below we have also included information about capital investment in the library service.

^{*} Under S106 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990, the library service benefits from contributions from developers towards the costs of providing community and social infrastructure, the need for which has arisen as a result of a new development taking place. This funding is known as 'Section 106'.

^{**}The Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) is a charge which can be levied by local authorities on new development in their area. It is an important tool for local authorities to use to help them deliver the infrastructure needed to support development in their area.

Support from town and parish councils

For the third year, we asked town and parish councils to make a voluntary contribution to help support the service - and if they wished to get involved, to participate in library working groups so that we get local feedback about the service and how we can improve it for residents. Many thanks to all those who chose to do so. We are again inviting voluntary contributions for the financial year 2020-21. Please note the following:

- The council is a local authority responsible for delivering the statutory library service in West Berkshire. We are not delegating or transferring the responsibility to town and parish councils, nor are we levying a charge on the parish councils.
- We are asking town and parish councils to support the service at local level to help residents benefit from the library service and from the library buildings as community hubs for a range of local activities.
- Contributions are voluntary and ring-fenced within a specific budget, for example for a specific library branch or for the mobile library service only, so that they directly benefit parish residents.
- We will request a contribution each year rather than request a commitment for a number of years at a time.

Volunteers

Our volunteers have continued to support us throughout the year with high standards of engagement and support for our communities across West Berkshire Libraries. During the year 354 volunteers spent over 12,900 hours helping to keep our libraries open. This was an increase of 7.48% compared to last year.

They have helped with and run many activities such as IT lessons, Code Club, Craft Sessions, Rhymetimes, Storytimes, visiting our At Home members and much more.

Volunteers also promoted the Space Chase Summer Reading Challenge by visiting a record number of 51 local primary schools throughout the district to engage with young children and encourage them to visit the library to complete the challenge. This also provided a wonderful opportunity for them to promote more generally what the library service has to offer.

This year we tried a new initiative and asked West Berkshire Council staff from other departments to help us promote the Summer Reading Challenge at Newbury Library and connect with young people. 18 staff took part in this, working 82 hours between them, including our Chief Executive and the Leader of the Council.

The role of the volunteer has developed and changed over the years, with some volunteers becoming permanent or casual staff members. New tasks, such as helping with stock work using our library management system, have given volunteers a new challenge. Volunteers have also helped us to promote the contactless and card payment facilities on our self-service machines by making sure our customers know their PIN.

We have also helped 50 young people complete their volunteering section for their Duke of Edinburgh placement this year.

We have six volunteer organisers but are looking for three more for Burghfield Common, Newbury and Mortimer Libraries. Our volunteers enjoy the experience of working in libraries and we are proud that our average retention is more than 2.5 years.

Burghfield Common Library

It's been a busy year for this rural library, with lots of fun had by all and the number of visitors to the library, new library members and library loans all on the increase. Links have continued to be forged with the local community with weekly visits from Little Footprints Montessori Nursery and monthly visits from The Rainbow Montessori Nursery; articles submitted for both Burghfield Parish and Sulhamstead and Ufton Nervet Parish newsletters; participation in the Burghfield Scarecrow Festival and St Mary's Burghfield Christmas Tree Festival.

From Easter 2019 through to February half term 2020 the library was busy with special one-off events for children and families.

These were in addition to its usual activities. During Easter 2019 the library became a crime scene for 22 young Fraud Scene Investigators, as part of the NatWest Bank educational programme. Later that holiday, eight Hearing Dogs for the Disabled puppies visited the library to raise awareness of this service and the training that is undertaken before these dogs are partnered with a deaf person.

During October half term 12 families attended Bird Nest Box making workshops and bird feeder activities. Feedback was received that some boxes were later occupied!

February half term saw Erica and Frank Mudd bring their Pop-Up Play Village to the library: an incredibly popular event with families and a one-off for the library. The week continued with author Rachel Jane attending to read from her Little Campervan storybooks and to lead craft activities. The week ended with Katie Black's Cookery Doodle Doo running two cookery classes for children. In March, World Book Day was celebrated with Mrs Bland's Infants School visiting for Storytime and 1st Burghfield Pioneer Beaver Colony held their meeting in the library to complete their Book Badge.

Hungerford Library

Hungerford Library has been part of the Hungerford Hub since 2018, when the Hub team took over the management of the library building. This has allowed the building to be used when the library is closed, and the Hub team hosted many events during the year, including eco craft fayres, book talks, arts and crafts workshops, foreign language classes, flower arranging workshops, business meetings, children's events and much more.

We have continued to work closely with the Hungerford Hub team during the year, and developed some joint initiatives such as selling cards. We are also working with them to review the layout of the library.



We are pleased that we attracted a significant number of new library members during the year – an increase of 17.95%. We continued to run a variety of library events, and the weekly Rhymetimes for under 5s and their grown-ups proved so popular that we added an extra session each Wednesday. The Jigsaw Puzzle Library launched with a range of puzzles for adults and children.

Holiday-time craft sessions were very popular, with paper swans, bubble painting and making musical instruments among the activities offered. We also enjoyed live harp and saxophone music at some of these. LEGO Club continued to be popular during the year.

We were delighted to host a visit from the Guide Dog puppies, and also the Watermill Theatre one-woman production of The Three Little Pigs.

Guests at our pre-Christmas Italian evening enjoyed a taste of festive food and tried their language skills.

Lambourn Library

We are really pleased that the number of active library borrowers increased this year by over 4.26%. Reservations of books by Lambourn customers has also gone up by 41.6%. In addition to this, our library groups continued to thrive and numbers grew, particularly for our Friday morning Rhymetime sessions, which proved to be extremely popular. This year we have used money donated from the Lambourn community to purchase a lovely bean bag support seat for use in the children's area, which is very popular with the little ones, both in the Rhymetime sessions for babies and toddlers and with older children at other times.

In the summer of 2019 we arranged class visits to the library for all Year 3 and Year 4 pupils from Lambourn Primary School to encourage them to be involved in the Summer Reading Challenge. This was very successful and the children loved using our self-service kiosk. Lots of children joined the library who hadn't been before and then continued to visit us afterwards - our new borrower figures at Lambourn increased by over 40% largely as a result of this. We certainly plan to do this again in the future.

Our school holiday craft activities have also proved very popular and we really value our network of volunteers and the 'Friends of Lambourn Library', who put such thought, time and effort into providing these activities and groups, as well as helping in the general running of the library service in Lambourn. The usage of our public computers declined during the year, but we hope that the installation of the new hardware and software will see them used more in the future.

Mortimer Library

We have invested a significant amount of capital funding to refresh and replace library stock at Mortimer – an increase of 115.24% on the previous year. We hope that this will increase the use of the library and attract new library members.

A number of library activities and events took place, including a children's craft session once a month, which was run by volunteers. The library also participated in the Scarecrow Trail, with library volunteers making a 'Tweety Pie' effigy.

In collaboration with 'Made in Mortimer', we now have a display cabinet in the library to showcase village crafts.

Stratfield Mortimer Parish Council continues to rent office space at the rear of the library and discussions have been taking place during the year to progress the plan for them to take over the management of the library building. West Berkshire Council will continue to run the library service, but this arrangement will allow the Parish Council and the Mortimer village community to make more use of the library building on the days when it is closed to the public.



Newbury Library

Another busy year, with 171,119 visitors coming into Newbury Library - an increase of 2.28%. In addition to regular Storytimes, twice weekly Rhymetimes and groups and clubs such as our popular Code Club, Craft and Chat sessions, VIPs (visually impaired) Book Group and weekly help with computing, we hosted a range of other events and activities at the library:

- Monthly LEGO Club, including a 'Library of the Future' display developed in conjunction with construction company ENGIE.
- Family History Help sessions bookable individual sessions run by Berkshire Family History Society every week.
- U3A book groups and a new creative writing group, meeting monthly.
- Red Cross drop-in sessions weekly volunteer(s) available for queries, hire of wheelchairs and other equipment.
- 'Knitted Map' on display in January, produced by local women and depicting many local landmarks and buildings (including the library!).
- Clive Goddard Exhibition & Workshop exhibition of cartoons featuring libraries and literature, plus a workshop for all ages on drawing cartoons. Clive is a children's author, illustrator and cartoonist.
- The Watermill Theatre visited us again in February with a performance of The Three Little Pigs, which proved incredibly popular.
- Chair Yoga class, run weekly by local yoga teacher Neeta Madahar.
- Flower arranging sessions run by Christina Francis, one of the attendees from our VIPs Book Group.
- Open Studios 2019 exhibition 'New in Town', promoting newly accredited artists.
- Open Studios also provided an ongoing rolling programme of artists' work in the study area
 of the library.

Pangbourne Library

The library was closed for refurbishment from 24 September and reopened on 1 October. It was an opportunity for the interior of the library to be refreshed and given a more modern appearance. The external signage and branding was also replaced and enhanced. Library users have responded positively to the refurbishment.

A reopening event took place attended by local West Berkshire Councillors Rick Jones and Gareth Hurley, with Langtree Secondary School Year 10 GCSE Music students providing much of the entertainment.

We are delighted that the number of new library members increased by 15.29% this year, and the number of library loans also showed an increase.

Regular Rhymetimes and Storytimes, held on alternate Thursday mornings during term time, were well attended and led by one of our enthusiastic volunteers.

Other regular events included:

- A Coffee and Craft group on Monday afternoons. The group usually attracted older library users, but was clearly valuable to residents who may otherwise experience some level of social isolation.
- Family History sessions, once a month on Tuesday afternoons. These were run by the Berkshire Family History Society and generated strong interest from customers.
- Library Book Group meetings took place once a month on Friday mornings.
- Craft activities for children during the school holidays.

In August the library hosted a Guide Dogs for the Blind event. It was an opportunity for the early socialisation of a group of guide dog puppies. Library visitors were able to learn more about the charity and the work that they undertake. It was a very successful event with more than 100 people attending.

The community in and around Pangbourne is very active in supporting charity coffee mornings. The library has been available as a venue for this for a number of years. The most recent coffee morning took place in September 2019 and raised more than £1,000 for Macmillan Cancer Support.


Thatcham Library

- Children's 'Make a Roman Villa' event, run by West Berkshire archaeologist Beth Asbury in February.
- Theale Library Children's Book Group first meeting attended with much excitement and enthusiasm in February.

All through the school summer holidays we offered the popular current craze of 'rock painting'. This was very popular with all ages of library users and everyone from pre-schoolers to pensioners took part.

We invited local primary schools to display their art work on our notice boards for a term. Children are delighted to see their school's work on display and it is an effective way of raising the profile of the library in the schools.

Theale Library customers are hugely generous with their donations to the library and we received over £1,000 during the year. With this money we have been able to buy exciting craft materials, prizes and a selection of games and toys. We have also bought display boards to increase the space for community posters and a set of 20 wrist bells for December Rhymetimes.

Our free e-library service has grown exponentially this year by 127.39%, with 89,634 e-downloads now making it our second most used library.

Our digital collection, which offers a wide range of e-books, e-audiobooks and e-magazines, has been growing steadily over the last ten years, but last year saw the biggest 12 month increase. In June 2019 we extended the range of e-formats available by launching our e-newspaper service PressReader. This gives library members free access to an all-you-can-read digital newsstand, with a vast selection of newspapers from across the world. 28,784 of this year's e-downloads can be attributed to this new service.
