Thank you to all our tutors and providers for the fantastic way you have responded to the challenges over the last year.

Prior to March the community learning service was on track to another successful year with new providers, a diverse course offer, growing enrolment numbers and an unprecedented high number of qualifications. In addition we were planning a new adult reading scheme, a lifelong learning consultation and new partnerships.

In response to Covide-19, tutors and providers have been. quick to develop new learning opportunities. Around 75% of providers moved their courses on-line and a number of new initiatives were introduced such

as <u>Creatively Engaged</u>, an online art exhibition, Recovery In Mind's on-line learner support, PACT's weekly newsletter and the Newbury College <u>At Home</u> programme.

Thank you for all your support, your work has enabled the community learning service to continue to deliver high quality courses to West Berkshire residents.

Tutor Forum


This year's Tutor Forum was a big success with a record number of tutors and providers attending the sessions via Zoom over a two day period.

Delivered on an annual basis the Forum provides an excellent opportunity for community learning tutors to update their professional skills, gain an awareness of the local and national sector and develop links with other providers across the service.

2019/20 in Numbers

The 2019/20 academic year was one of challenges and opportunities for the Community Learning service. During the autumn term learner enrolments were high with a wide range of providers and many new courses, particularly those leading to qualifications.

As Covid-19 developed the service responded to changing local priorities around health and wellbeing, supporting families and developing employment initiatives. Providers and tutors took up the challenge to address learner needs through the delivery of new courses, many on-line, and providing strong support to keep learners engaged.

Inevitably the service has suffered with a reduction in enrolments and fewer courses. In line with the rest of England learner numbers declined by around 30% with many of the very vulnerable learners unable to attend their courses. The Community Learning service will be working with our partners and other council services throughout the 2020/21 academic year to address local priorities and challenges and provide West Berkshire adults with a range of learning opportunities to enhance lives and move forward.

Recovering from Covid-19: Sector Update

Kick Start initiative

The Kickstart Scheme is a new £2 billion government initiative to support the creation of high quality 6-month work placements aimed at 16 to 24 year olds who are at risk of long term unemployment.

Access to the scheme is on a DWP referral basis and the placements will be paid in line with the national minimum wage. West Berkshire Council is working with local employers to develop the scheme across the Berkshire region.

Berkshire Redundancy and Redeployment Service

To support adults who have been made redundant the Thames Valley Berkshire LEP and the National Careers Service have developed the Berkshire Redundancy and Redeployment Service. The service is aimed at employers and employees to support the redundancy transition and to match individual skills and experience with job opportunities across the region.

Thames Valley Covid-19 Business Recovery Survey

The Local Enterprise Partnership (LEP) has published the results of a Berkshire wide survey into the impact of Covid-19 on the

local economy. The survey was carried out in June 2020 and included responses from 400 local businesses.

The results will contribute to local strategic planning including the LEP Skills Priority Statement, West Berkshire Council's Economic Development Plan and the Community Learning curriculum plan that addresses adult employment skills, qualifications and training.

A Positive Outlook for ACL

In mid-December the adult and community learning sector (ACL) was given a boost in a new report from the Parliamentary Education Select Committee. Described as the 'jewel in the crown' of the nation's post 19 education landscape the committee recommended that four key pillars were needed to revolutionise the ACL system:

- A community learning centre in every town
- Individual Learning Accounts to support lifelong learning
- Nurse part-time higher education back to health through the re-introduction of grants
- Skills tax credit to revitalise employer led training

Additional recommendations include childcare, ESOL support, information, advice and guidance and support for adult learners with special needs.





Getting Back to Normal

Learners are returning to the Newbury Community Resource Centre (NCRC) to continue their courses that were interrupted by the lockdown. With most sessions delivered on a 1-1 basis the Centre has worked with the learners to ensure their training is delivered safely taking in to account the government's Covid-19 regulations.

Targeting vulnerable adults the NCRC course programme is a mix of non-accredited provision and qualifications that support adults back in to learning with specific focus on gaining vocational skills and knowledge. The courses develop skills in carpentry, maintenance of electrical appliances, customer service and warehousing.

For those learners who prefer to learn in a group the Growing2gether gardening and horticulture workshops continue to be delivered at Cottismore Nursery. All sessions are delivered in accordance with the government guidelines outside in the fresh air although there is cover and heating if the weather is too challenging!


Recovery in Mind
